







ECC Feeder High School Enrollment




Compton Feeder High School Enrollment

A few words about the budget....

- California Community College Budget
 - 2% access funding for growth
 - 1.29% funding for general operating expense increase
 - Zero Cola
 - \$200 million in Strong Workforce Program ongoing funding
 - \$30 million in Basic Skills
 - \$184.6 Million for deferred maintenance, instructional equipment

Some words of caution:

- Proposition 30 is temporary
 - Proposition 55 is on the November ballot
- STRS and PERS increases
 - STRS Employer Rate Increase to 12.58% (from 10.73%)
 - PERS Employer Rate Increase to 13.888% (from 11.847%)
- Decline in enrollment leading to stabilization at ECC
- Economic uncertainty is in the forecast

- Board Budget Workshop on September 7 @ 3:00 p.m.
- Proposed Adopted Budget at September 7 Board meeting @ 4:00 p.m.

- Strengthening customer service


