

Age by Gender

The age distribution of El Camino College students truly reflects lifelong learning for the college with representation from children through senior citizens and an average student age of 27. However, over half of enrolled students are 18 to 23, with a median age of 22 and a mode of 19.



Ethnicity

El Camino College (ECC) is a broadly diverse campus serving a large percentage of African-American, Latino, Asian and White students, reflecting the diversity of the district. The college is considered a Hispanic-serving Institution, with Latinos representing the largest ethnic group on campus. The campus also serves a significant Filipino population.

Age by Ethnicity

The table below presents point measures of age for each ethnic group¹. The mean age tends to be considerably higher than the median due to significant numbers of non-traditional students across the entire age spectrum. The mode is 19 for all groups except for African-Americans whose mode is 18.

In general, the Asian, African-American, White or American Indian/Alaskan Native student tends to be older, while the Filipino, Latino and Pacific Islander are relatively younger than the ECC student population as a whole.



Age Distribution by Ethnicity (following page)

As indicated above, most ethnic groups at El Camino College represent varying percentages of the student body relative to age or age group. White students are more likely to be represented in very young and older age groups, while Latino students are more likely to be found in the traditional college ages and in the 20's and 30's. Some but less-pronounced variability is found among other ethnic groups.


The chart on the following page represents the *percentage* of students from each ethnicity within each age or age group. Smaller groups (American Indian/Alaskan Native) and unidentifiable groups (decline to state and unknown) were excluded from the chart but are found in the statistics table above.

¹ Definitions of descriptive statistics used to measure age: *mean* age is the average age, or the single age that best describes the ECC student body; *median* age is the age at which 50% of the ECC population lies above and below; and *mode* age is the single most common age.



Citizenship and Residency Status

The vast majority of students at El Camino College are U.S. citizens but a significant portion of the population (nearly 3%) is international students coming from over 60 countries. The top 10 source countries are provided below. Over 95% of all students are officially California residents.

Disability Status




Enrollment and Educational Status

The majority of El Camino College students are continuing students from the previous spring term. A much smaller group of students (7%) are returning, indicating that they had enrolled at El Camino College in at least one term before spring 2004. Over 25% of students are new to ECC, either new to any college (22%) or transferring from another (3%). Some students take classes at El Camino College while they are still in high school and have a special admissions status. These represent about 3% of the student body in fall 2004.




Nearly 90% of ECC students have at least a high school diploma or the equivalent. Over 10% of students have an Associate's degree or higher. And about 9% of students are not high school graduates: a third of these are still in high school.




Campus Enrollment Patterns

Courses at El Camino College are offered 7 days a week and during both daytime and evening hours to serve its district community. The majority of students (68%) enroll in at least one daytime class, while 27% are enrolled exclusively in evening classes. Over 16,000 students are on campus attending classes Monday through Thursday (bottom table), more than twice the number of Friday attendees.

* **Day students** are defined as those who are taking *at least one* daytime class (i.e., beginning before 4:30 p.m.). **Evening students** are defined as taking no daytime classes and at least one evening class.




Students on Campus by Day of the Week

Educational Goal

The educational goal of enrolled students is captured on the initial application and is only updated by the student by special request or when reapplying after a break in attendance.


The largest percentage of students (42%) indicated an intention to transfer to a 4-year institution as their goal. The second largest category was undecided goal at 32%. About 6% of students desired to attain an Associate's degree or certificate from El Camino College.





Unit Load

Nearly 27% of students are enrolled full-time, defined as carrying 12 units or more (see pie chart), while over one-third are enrolled in fewer than 6 units. The remainder falls between these two categories.

Student Retention and Success


Student academic performance can be measured in several ways. Most common are student *retention* (completing a course, regardless of final grade), *success* (completing a course with a C/CR or better) and Grade Point Average (*GPA*).

Success and retention along with a course grade distribution are provided in the table below. At El Camino College, students are retained at a rate of about 80%. Over 65% succeed by receiving a C/CR or better in a course. The overall term GPA is **2.70**.

Enrollment Persistence


Persistence is a measure of academic program success defined as the rate at which students return to college in subsequent terms. Persistence rates of students who began their academic programs at El Camino in fall 2003 are provided below. A cohort ² of full-time, new, degree- or transfer-directed students was tracked over 4 terms of enrollment by age at entering term.

Nearly 84% of the entering group enrolled for one full academic year; 68% in 3 terms; and 58% in two full years of college. The table and chart below reveal that younger full-time students tend to have higher rates of retention, especially at ages 17 and 18.

² A *cohort* is a group of people with some common trait, who typically are tracked over time. The common trait of the fall 2003 cohort is that they all entered El Camino as new, full-time students with 2-year or 4-year degree goals.

Degrees Conferred and Completion Rate


Another measure of academic persistence is the *completion rate*, or the rate at which new students receive degrees or become "transfer-prepared" by accumulating sufficient units to transfer to a 4-year institution. The latest rate available (fall 2001 cohort) is: **36.2%**.

The number of degrees and certificates conferred in the 2004-2005 academic year is provided below by degree type and division. Over 80% of awards were AA or AS degrees. The divisions with the largest proportion of degrees conferred include Business, Health Sciences, Instructional Services, Behavioral and Social Sciences, and Industry and Technology.
