STEP 1 | Admission

Who is eligible for Admission?

Anyone 18 years of age or older qualifies for admission to El Camino College Compton Center. If under the age of 18, you will qualify if you have 1) graduated from high school or 2) passed the California High School Certificate of Proficiency Test.

El Camino College Compton Center may admit as a special part-time or special full-time student anyone in grades 11 or 12 who, in the opinion of the provost, may benefit from instruction. Concurrently enrolled 11th and 12th grade students must comply with all policies, follow all procedures, and meet all requirements by the published deadlines for each semester and/or session.

California Residence Requirement

Can I apply as a California resident?

To attend El Camino College Compton Center as a resident of California, a student is required to have been a legal resident of the state, as defined in the California Education Code, for more than one year immediately preceding the residence determination date. The residence determination date is the day preceding the first day of the semester or session.

In addition you must meet the two-year intent provisions of California residency code, and must not have engaged in any actions that are contrary to establishing residency in the state of California.

How Do I Apply?

Apply online by visiting: www.compton.edu and clicking on **Apply Online** - it's that easy! New and returning students (those with an absence of two consecutive semesters, excluding Summer and Winter Session) must complete an application. Don't forget to submit official transcripts from all accredited colleges and trade schools attended. If you are applying for Advanced Placement credit, then you must submit your official high school transcripts.

Step 2 | Assessment

How Do I Make Arrangements For Testing?

Personal identification with a photograph and your El Camino College Compton Center I.D. number are required to take tests and receive results.

You must have an application on file prior to any testing. Testing should be completed as soon as possible after you file your admission application. Read the catalog description of classes which interest you to learn if there is any testing recommended or needed. Keep in mind that all placement tests are part of the multiple measures of the assessment process. Be sure to take testing results with you when you go for your academic advisement or educational planning sessions.

The placement tests for English, English as a Second Language, and Math are computerized and given on a drop-in basis—no appointment is necessary. Other tests, such as the Chemistry Placement Test, are given on an appointment-basis only. Please contact the Assessment Center for further information at 310-900-1600 ext. 2830.

All testing is done on campus at the Assessment Center. Testing must be completed before you register for courses. Retesting is limited and may not be done after you have enrolled in any course related to the test.

STEP 3 | Orientation

Welcome to El Camino College Compton Center! All students are encouraged to participate in orientation and to become familiar with the center and its resources.

Sign-up for Winter 2009 student orientations in the Counseling Department, located in the Administration Building. Students learn about campus services and programs through the orientation provided by the Counseling Department.

STEP 4 | Counseling/ Advisement

How can I get help selecting classes?

Counseling services are available to students through scheduled appointments. A student who has selected a major field of study is strongly encouraged to see one of the counselors assigned to that field; an undeclared or undecided student may see any counselor.

As an integral part of the matriculation program, counseling services are intended to assist students in clarifying career and life goals and in developing an appropriate course of study based on a student's goals, aptitudes and interests.

Drop-in advisement is available Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Fridays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for students who have questions which do not require transcript review. The drop-in advisement schedule is subject to change, based on counselor availability. Please call the Counseling Department in advance for the daily schedule at 310-900-1600 ext. 2076.



STEP 5 | Registration

How do I prepare to register?

Ready – Set – Register!

- Be sure you meet any prerequisites and corequisites.
- Meet with a counselor to ensure your schedule is in line with your educational goals.

New Procedure

Registration appointment information for continuing students will be available beginning November 10, 2008. For new and returning students, this information will be available on or after December 1. Please go online to www.compton.edu, click on **MyECC - Registration Appointment Time**. You may also check by telephone by calling (310) 516-9339.

Before you go online or register by telephone, you must confirm your registration date and time.

When Do I Register?

Find out your registration date and time - it is available online at: www.compton.edu - click on **MyECC - Registration Appointment Time**.

Students may not register prior to the assigned date and time.

How Do I Register?

Register online at www.compton.edu and click on **MyECC** or by telephone at 310-516-9339. You will be given clear, easy-to-follow, step-by-step instructions. Computers are available for student use in the Welcome Center, Financial Aid, Admission Office Informational Center, VT 209, and Library.

STEP 6 | Pay Fees

All students who enroll in credit classes must pay an enrollment fee. Students must pay the appropriate enrollment fee at the time of registration. Financial assistance (Board of Governor's Fee Waiver) is available to pay the registration fees and the health fee if the student is eligible. A Board of Governor's Fee Waiver application is available online at www.compton.edu - **MyECC**, or apply at the Financial Aid Office.

Until all fees are paid, students will not be able to purchase parking permits, receive transcripts, or register for upcoming semesters.

The general fee requirement shall not apply to students enrolled in the non-credit courses specified in Education Code Section 84711.

Out-of-state students who have a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on file in the Financial Aid Office are encouraged to submit the preliminary documents for review as early as possible. **Students are responsible for paying all fees and charges even if they applied for financial aid by the established deadlines.**

Fees

You are liable for all fees unless you drop the class by the refund deadline date.
Fees are due within 7 days of phone or Web registration. Walk-In Registrants:

Financial Assistance

All students are encouraged to apply for financial aid by visiting the Financial Aid Office Web site at:

www.compton.edu. Begin by clicking the Apply Online button and follow the instructions for a new student (never attended college) or returning student (break in enrollment) or continuing student (no break in enrollment) column. Please review the available resources on the financial aid Web site under the Information Desk, Programs, Services and Free Calculators. California residents may wish to apply for a Board of Governor's Fee Waiver (BOGW) to pay for their enrollment fees. Students are encouraged to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine eligibility for all federal, state and institutional programs. Some students in certain programs such as CalWORKS, CARE, or EOP&S may also complete the fee waiver application in addition to the FAFSA form. Please see enclosed applications.

Health Services Fee

All fees are subject to change. El Camino College Compton Center students have the option to pay \$14 each semester to cover the operation, supervision, programs, and services of the student health services at El Camino College.

If a Compton student comes to the El Camino College cashier window and asks to use the El Camino College Health Center, they will be charged the \$14 fee for the access to those services.

There are exceptions under these conditions:

1. Students receiving financial aid pursuant to Section 72252.1.

2. Low-income students who meet the Board of Governors grant criteria (pursuant to Section 72252) as demonstrated by appropriate support documentation of eligibility; SSI eligibility; or GA eligibility; Veterans Affairs Dependent Fee Waiver Certification; Agency Certification or Income Tax form as they relate to qualifying income levels; or a combination of these and unmet student need as determined by the Financial Aid Office.

3. Students who depend exclusively upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination or organization. Students will not be required to pay this fee if they are enrolled only in classes held off campus, only in distance education classes, only in non-credit classes or work site classes. High school students or students enrolled in contract classes only are also exempt.

Refund: Students who withdraw from all courses prior to the close of the second week of the term will be eligible for a refund of the Health Services Fee. Forms to request a refund may be obtained at the Bursar's Office.

Health services are provided for students 18 years of age or older who pay the mandatory health fee. High school students permitted to attend the college on a concurrent enrollment basis are not eligible for health services. **College students under 18 years of age subject to other admissions criteria must pay the health fee and submit a parental or guardian consent form to receive health services. Children, including children of students, are not permitted in Student Health Services.**

Fee Payment

For any fee paid, the college will accept personal checks drawn on United States banks, money orders or cash.

Also honored will be VISA, American Express, MasterCard and Discover credit cards. Checks returned by a student's bank for any reason will result in (1) suspension from enrollment, (2) denial of subsequent registration and (3) detention of transcript until the financial obligation has been satisfied. A service charge of \$20 will be charged on any returned check.

Refunds of Fees

Students must drop their classes through the online system located in the Administration Building, by phone or by Web, according to the following schedule:

Classes must be dropped by Tuesday, January 13, 2009.

To receive a refund for a parking permit, you must return your permit to the cashier's window within this same time period. Refund checks will be mailed before the end of the semester.

If your address has changed, please update the change in the Admissions Office.

Non-Resident Refund Policy

To receive a refund of your non-resident tuition, you must drop your classes through the on-line system in the Admissions and Records Office (Administration Building) according to the following schedule:

100% refund for classes dropped by Friday, February 20, 2009.

75% refund for classes dropped by Friday, February 27, 2009

50% refund for classes dropped by Friday, March 6, 2009.

25% refund for classes dropped by Friday, March 13, 2009.

Refund checks will be mailed before the end of the semester.

California Residency

To attend El Camino College Compton Center as a qualified California resident, you must have established legal residence in the state one year and one day prior to the start of the term. In addition, you must meet the two-year intent provisions of California residency code and must not have engaged in any actions that are contrary to establishing residency in the state of California. The burden of proof to clearly demonstrate both physical presence in California and intent to establish California residence lies with the student in accordance with Education Code Section 68040.

The residence of an unmarried student under the age of 19 is determined by the legal residence of the parents. A married minor determines residency from the date of marriage and must comply with all provisions of residency as cited above. A person may not derive residence from a spouse.

Priority Registration

In compliance with Section 51825 of Title 5, California Administrative Code, priority registration will be implemented in this way:

1. Special registration assistance to the handicapped or disadvantaged students as defined by statute for the purpose of providing equalization of education.

2. Students will receive priority registration according to this ranking system and criteria:

- Registration priority will be awarded as follows:
 - A. First priority: continuing students
 - B. Second priority: new and readmit students
- For fall and spring semesters, the enrollment of continuing students in accordance with priority system established on the basis of these factors:
 - A. One point for each unit completed at El Camino College Compton Center plus one point for each unit in which the student is currently enrolled (midterm) with a maximum of 60 points.
 - B. Points awarded according to the total units in the current program after the 12th week as follows: 0 to 3 units equals 0 points; 3.5 to 6 units equals 2 points; 6.5 to 9 units equals 4 points; 9.5 units to 15 points equals 6 points and 15.5 plus units equals 10 points.
 - C. A reward of 15 points to students for maintaining their original unit load

from the start of the semester through the 12th week.

D. A reward of 10 points to students with 2.0 or higher cumulative GPA

E. Day and evening programs are used to divide the student body into a day or extended day priority system. One or more day classes constitutes a day program.

3. The early enrollment of students who meet one of these guidelines:

- Instruction program requires time off campus limiting the choice of class periods on campus.
- The instructional activity requires a block of time associated with scheduled classes for such activities as practice, meetings, counseling and off-campus travel.
- First semester F-1 visa students.

Adds and Drops

It is the student's responsibility to process an official withdrawal from class. Failure to do so may result in a letter grade of A through F. A student may drop a class or classes within the refund period and add another class or classes using the fees already paid.

If a student drops after the refund deadline, payment of fees for the classes is forfeited. Any added class will require additional fees.

A student may drop a class before the refund deadline and add a class with no additional fees. If a student drops a class after the refund deadline in order to add the same class at a different time/date/instructor, the student must request a lateral transfer or level transfer from both instructors. All transfers are processed through the Admissions and Records Office.

Withdrawal from Class

It is the student's responsibility to process an official withdrawal from class at the Admissions and Records Office. Failure to complete this process may result in a letter grade of A through F recorded on the student's permanent record.

It is the high school student's responsibility to submit all required documentation on time and complete by the published deadlines. Failure to do so will jeopardize the student's enrollment for the semester/session.

Photo Identification and ASB Stickers

All students are required to obtain a free El Camino College Compton Center identification card. These cards are available in the Student Life Office Monday - Thursday, 8 a.m. - 8:30 p.m. and Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

These cards serve as photo identification, and are required for Library services, campus activities, access to the Learning Resource Center and Open Computer Labs, and to verify attendance in classes.

All students are encouraged to purchase an optional ASB sticker for their photo identification cards during registration at the Bursar's Office. The ASB sticker offers a variety of discounts at businesses, theaters, ASB sponsored events, and athletics events. El Camino College Compton Center students can also utilize ASB stickers on the El Camino College campus including access to Activities Center table games, free admission to all campus athletic events and a discount on tickets at district-sponsored Center for the Arts events. Funds generated from the cards help support student activities. The \$10 sticker fee per semester is nonrefundable.

Attendance

If you enroll in a class and you do not attend the first scheduled meeting of the class, you may be dropped from the roster and your place may be given to a waiting student.

Children in Classrooms

Children are not permitted in classrooms while class is in session. Attendance in class is limited to officially enrolled students and authorized visitors or guests only. In addition, students shall not allow children to be left unattended or unsupervised anywhere on campus. It is the responsibility of each faculty member to inform students of this requirement.

Student Records

Congress has provided in the "Family Education Rights and Privacy Act" that students have certain rights of access to their education records. A copy of the Act is located in the Library. Please contact the Admissions Office for any information regarding your rights under the Act.

Equivalent Courses

Courses completed at other colleges and universities may be used to meet a prerequisite. Some high school courses, as stated in the college catalog, may also be used to meet a prerequisite.

Students who have completed equivalent courses at another college or in high school must have copies of necessary transcripts. Do not delay. Order transcripts and clear prerequisites prior to registration. Clearance for an equivalent course may be obtained in the Counseling Department or the Academic Affairs Office (C-32) located in the Administration Building.

Transcripts

If you plan to attend under veterans or Social Security benefits, receive academic advisement to become matriculated, or need to have coursework at other colleges reviewed for prerequisite clearance, you must request college transcripts from all schools you have attended be sent to the El Camino College Records Office.

If you plan to graduate from El Camino College with a degree or certificate and wish to have course work taken at other colleges considered for graduation, you must request official transcripts to be mailed from the other colleges to the El Camino College Records Office. Hand carried transcripts from the student or any other party will not be accepted.

Your first two El Camino College transcripts are free. Additional transcripts incur a fee as determined by college policy and payable at the time of the tran-

script request. Transcripts are processed on a first in, first out basis.

Cross Enrollment at CSU Dominguez Hills

El Camino College Compton Center students who are eligible may cross-enroll at CSU Dominguez Hills without formal admission and without payment of state university tuition, in a maximum of one baccalaureate-level course per semester on a space available basis. Such enrollment would be at the discretion of the appropriate campus authorities on each of the campuses.

A student must meet the requirements of cross enrollment to be eligible
