First Year Experience Program Helps Build Student's Confidence



In 2009, Diego Ramos graduated from Dominguez Hills High School in Compton. He was looking forward to attending California State University Los Angeles in the fall of 2009, until his financial aid application did not go through. It was at this point that he enrolled in El Camino College Compton Center's First Year Experience (FYE) program designed to help students succeed in their first year attending college.

One element of the FYE program involves inviting guest speakers into the classroom who provide college advising and counseling. Diego remembers one such speaker from the University of California, Berkeley. "She talked a lot about minorities in college, which really resonated with me," explains Diego. "I am a minority and it showed me that transferring was possible."

Transferring became more than a possibility for Diego. After being accepted to the University of California at Irvine, the University of California at Santa Cruz and the University of California at Santa Barbara, it became a reality and a big decision.

He works primarily as an assemblage painter and enjoys combining traditional oil painting with manipulated paper that is sometimes embroidered or treated in other ways, to create pieces that resemble fabric.

Today, Diego is studying art at University of California, Irvine and is looking forward to earning his bachelor's degree. His future plans include possibly earning a Master of Fine Arts degree, as well as joining an artist residency program.

The Compton Community College District, along with many other public agencies and school districts in California, is currently in the process of reviewing and modifying its elected trustee area boundaries. Every 10 years, community colleges, city councils and other local agencies must adjust their election boundaries in order to equalize the population and ensure fair elections.

The Redistricting Committee adheres to an action plan that documents the steps taken to submit revised Trustee Area maps. The Redistricting Committee first provided draft plans with four options of Trustee Area maps which were available online for public input beginning October 2011. Multiple opportunities for input included public hearings in November 2011, March and May 2012.

At the May 2012 CCCD Board meeting, a map was adopted by resolution, for new Trustee election areas. A waiver for amending Trustee elections was submitted to the California Community College’s Board of Governors.

Upon approval from the Board of Governors, the new Trustee Area map will be submitted to the Los Angeles County Recorder’s Office by October 15, 2012. The new CCCD Trustee areas are effective for the November 2013 elections.

Career Advancement Academy Established

The Career Advancement Academy at ECC Compton Center is part of a statewide initiative designed to increase the access to higher education that leads to jobs. The program combines career technical education with basic skills in high-demand career areas where new workers are needed immediately.

Funded by a \$662,700 grant from the California Community Colleges Chancellor’s Office, the Career Advancement Academy also has technical support from the Career Ladders Project.

The Career Advancement Academy at ECC Compton Center offers programs in machine tool technology/ aerospace fastener manufacturing and welding. Enrolling in one of these programs is a proactive first step for students wanting to gain valuable, marketable skills and set themselves up for successful, new careers.

Students in the program benefit from: numerous career skills workshops covering topics such as resume writing, interviewing, job retention, interpersonal skills relating to the workplace, industry specific “green” classes, and total quality management. Books are also paid for, in addition to workplace safety boots for each student. The program culminates in an exclusive job fair with employers looking to hire.

Students Get Hired into Growing Aerospace Fastener Manufacturing Industry

Jairo Juarez-Lazo and his father, Jose Juarez, completed El Camino College Compton Center's Aerospace Fastener Manufacturing summer training program together. After graduating from California State University, Dominguez Hills with a degree in graphic design, Jairo struggled to find a full-time position in the field and saw the ECC Compton Center program as an opportunity to start a career in manufacturing. Alternately Jose, a centerless grinder and veteran in the industry, viewed the program as a way to advance his career.

He was right. Since completing the summer program, Jose was hired at ALCOA Fastening Systems, the world's leading producer of aluminum. And, an additional 12 ECC Compton Center students from the Aerospace Fastener Manufacturing program have been hired in the last year by PB Fasteners and Alcoa. For Jairo, the program motivated him to continue his education in the field and he is now enrolled in the ongoing Machine Tool Technology/Aerospace Fastener Manufacturing program offered by ECC Compton Center's Career and Technical Education division.

"By completing the summer training program together, my dad and I were able to benefit from each other's strengths. My background in graphic design allowed me to help him better understand blueprinting, while his 15 years of experience were a great resource for me in the machinery courses," said Jairo. "The instructors were also very helpful in identifying our strengths. One of them discovered I had a degree in graphic design and opened my eyes to a career I had never considered—making the actual blueprints for the parts to be manufactured."

El Camino College Compton Center Mathematics Instructor Participates in Jaime Escalante Legacy Project

El Camino College Compton Center instructor Ruth Zambrano dedicates her summers to engaging inner-city youth in a demanding academic schedule of pre-college and college mathematics through the Jaime Escalante Math Program where she teaches pre-Algebra and algebra.

Zambrano, who teaches courses such as basic arithmetic skills, pre-algebra, elementary algebra, intermediate algebra and college algebra at ECC Compton Center, has been a part of the Jaime Escalante Math Program since 2007. This mathematical "boot-camp" provides rigorous instruction in intermediate and advanced mathematics to middle and high school aged students in order to improve their chances of being accepted to university-level math and science programs. The program is the legacy of Jaime Escalante, a former math instructor at Garfield High School in Los Angeles who is also the subject of the 1988 film *Stand and Deliver*. During his tenure, Escalante

dramatically improved the performance of his students by demanding the most out of them with a "hard work for student and teacher alike" approach.


Zambrano's approachable, attentive teaching style lends itself to this innovative, total immersion mathematics program where students cover one year of mathematics (two semesters) in seven weeks.

"In spending four hours per day, five days a week with students, you really get to know their strengths and weaknesses and are better able to meet their needs," says Zambrano. "I try to do the same thing with my students at ECC Compton Center by giving step-by-step instruction, creating a comfortable environment for questions, and making myself available for one-on-one tutoring."

Zambrano spent her formative years in Huntington Park and Lynwood. One aspect of participating in the Escalante Program and teaching at ECC Compton Center that she finds particularly rewarding is working with students in the communities where she grew up.

He encourages all members of the community to make an education at ECC Compton Center the foundation for addressing career goals.




