The fall 2011 semester began on Saturday, August 27, 2011. Currently, the El Camino College Compton Center is well on its way to meeting the 2011-2012 target of 6,000 full-time equivalent students. Congratulations to faculty, staff and administrators for supporting the El Camino College Compton Center student success efforts.

The next Board of Trustees meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 27, 2011. The District's elevators are under a preventive maintenance service contract with ThyssenKrupp Elevator Service and are subject to State testing and permits to maintain safe operations.

The elevator was undergoing its five (5) year load test and failed. The contractor discovered a leaking piston was the cause. After repairs were made, the elevator was restored to service. During the 2nd load test, the unit again failed and the contractor, at no cost to the District, replaced a speed control valve and control board. The car is back in service under a temporary permit and pending a final test for State certification.

ThyssenKrupp will begin the testing during the second week of September 2011. If all goes to plan, they will request the State to inspect for annual operating permit.

The repair, test and permit schedule:

June 15, 2011

Initial five (5) year load test

August 8, 2011

New piston assembly installed

August 15, 2011

Elevator car service restored

August 29, 2011

2nd load test failed

September 1, 2011

New speed control valve and control board replaced at no cost

September 2, 2011

Elevator car returned to service using a temporary permit

September 12, 2011

3rd load test for final inspection and State permitting

Given the significance of the elevator failure mode, an insurance claim through Keenan and Associate with Hartford Steam Boiler has been filed. Claim representative visited site to complete report. The total cost to repair the elevator is approximately \$34,000.

The Compton Community College District (CCCD) temporarily closed access to the track and football field for repairs on August 1, 2011. Notice to the public was issued on August 11, 2011. Signs were posted on campus Website and notices posted along the track and field perimeter.

During the closer, Maintenance and Operations Staff accomplished the following:

- Repaired irrigation sprinkler system for even and efficient watering
- Imported dirt and leveled playing field and reset access boxes
- Fertilized turf and reseeded turf around long jump and shot pits
- Removed weeds in and around pits and trimmed out turf area
- Abated insect and animals from the seating and storage area
- Repaired light fixtures and installed new lamps in stands and around perimeter
- Primed, prep and painted restroom and food prep floors and bottom walls
- Primed, prep and painted stadium seating stem walls
- Removed graffiti and patched and repainted throughout
- Began repairs on public address system (Wendell Haynes)

Work was successfully completed on September 7, 2011 and ready to reopen the track and football field to Tartar athletes and community members. Ongoing turf care and routine maintenance will continue. Again, we apologize for the inconvenience.

1.0 BACKGROUND

The existing Server and Data systems in the MIS building were damaged as a result of intermittent high-heat exposure during the time period of 2006-2009, and having exceeded their useful life, were/are experiencing failures and interruptions in service that were/are increasing in frequency and duration. These failures have a cascading effect that, when coupled with the end of life status of the equipment, make a catastrophic, non-recoverable system failure a certainty in the near future which would cause a campus closure for 3-6 months in addition to the permanent loss of historic data.

It was determined that immediate action was required to continue existing operations with as little disruption to the educational program as possible and prevent the loss of essential systems including telephone, intranet, internet, data storage, and fire and security alarms. The design and installation of new building systems including framing and finishes, doors and access controls, electrical systems, HVAC, data connectivity, fire suppression systems and other work necessary to support and secure the new networking gear and servers was included in the scope of work.

At the regular meeting of the Compton Community College District Board of Trustees on March 8, 2011; a Public Contract Code Section 20113 Emergency Resolution, BSD 7, was passed by the Board of Trustees authorizing the CEO of the District to enter into such contracts as necessary to complete this work as quickly as possible. The Emergency Resolution was also approved by Los Angeles County Office of Education.

Work on the project began almost immediately after approval of the emergency resolution by the Board of Trustees. The work is being performed on a "fast-track" basis where construction activities were being performed as the district's consultants completed portions of the design. The project was bifurcated into two phases, Phase 1 addressing installation of the server array and networking gear and, Phase 2 addressing the remaining build-out of office and storage spaces in the balance of the MIS building.

Early on it became apparent that we had to add a Phase 1.1 which included building systems and/or components that would have been constructed and/or installed in Phase 2 but which were required to be completed in order to ensure functionality of the support systems included in Phase 1.

2.0 PROJECT STATUS

A preliminary budget and schedule based upon our best estimate of scope and duration was submitted to the CBO on April 4, 2011. The preliminary budget submittal requested \$2,399,975 for completion of the project which was scheduled to be completed by October 11, 2011. A budget of \$2,400,000 was authorized by BSD 7. The current projected project budget is \$2,567,055; \$167,055 over the approved preliminary budget. The current date of completion is November 14, 2011.

3.0 SOUTHLAND CHANGE ORDER

The original Southland Contract for completion of the work excluding design and provision of the server array and network gear was submitted to the board in the amount of \$500,000. It was noted on the original board report that, since evaluation of building systems and design work had not been completed at that time, the amount was a placeholder only. The current Southland change order represents the cost for the fully designed Phase 1 of the project as well as the Phase 1.1 referred to above.

El Camino College Compton Center's First Year Experience Program Helps Diego Ramos Build Confidence in Himself as a Student and an Artist

El Camino College Compton Center graduate Diego Ramos will transfer to the University of California, Irvine this fall to study studio art. He works primarily as an assemblage painter and enjoys combining traditional oil painting with manipulated paper that is sometimes embroidered or treated in other ways, to create pieces that resemble fabric. Despite a passion for the subject, Ramos did not always know that he wanted to explore a career in the arts.

In 2009, Ramos graduated from Dominguez Hills High School in Compton. He was looking forward to attending California State University Los Angeles in the fall of 2009, until his financial aid application did not go through. It was at this point that he was introduced to Rebeca Mason, director/counselor of ECC Compton Center's First Year Experience (FYE) Program. Initially Ramos was disappointed that he would not be attending California State University Los Angeles, but after meeting Mason and qualifying for the FYE program his outlook began to change.

The FYE program places students in a learning community where they develop key study skills, have access to vital campus and college resources and are given opportunities to explore different majors, as well as careers. Ramos credits the FYE program for helping to keep him on track with his classes, while also giving him an understanding of what is expected academically in college.

Another focus of the FYE program is to bring in guest speakers who provide college advising and counseling. Ramos remembers one such speaker from the University of California, Berkeley. "She talked a lot about minorities in college, which really resonated with me," explains Ramos. "I am a minority and it showed me that transferring was possible."

Transferring became more than a possibility for Ramos. After being accepted to the University of California at Irvine, the University of California at Santa Cruz and the University of California at Santa Barbara, it became a reality and a big decision. Ultimately, Ramos chose the University of California, Irvine because its art program is the best fit for him.

His plans for the future include earning a bachelor's degree, and possibly a master's degree in Fine Arts, as well as joining an artist residency program.

Ramos is extremely thankful for his experience at El Camino College Compton Center. "It gave me time to think about what I really wanted to do and the path that I wanted to take. Then programs like FYE and the professors gave me the tools to get there," said Ramos.

Recent El Camino College Compton Center Graduate Arlana Walton Transfers to UC Riverside, Inspires Her Mother and Sister to Attend College

Arlana Walton is the first of her siblings to graduate from high school, attend college and earn her associate degree. Now an alumna of El Camino College Compton Center, Walton and her three year old son, Zhay-lyn, will move from Long Beach to Riverside this fall where she will study psychology and sociology at the University of California, Riverside.

A Long Beach native, Walton attended Long Beach Poly High School and after graduating in 2006 enrolled at Long Beach City College (LBCC). While a student at LBCC, she became pregnant with her son and took a break from school. After Zhay-lyn was born and it came time to go back to school, Walton made the decision to transfer to ECC Compton Center in the fall of 2008.

"Once Zhay-lyn was born I really wanted to focus on school. I felt that in order to do that, I had to change my school environment and spend less time socializing and more time on academics," said Walton. "As soon as I arrived at El Camino College Compton Center, I knew I had made the right choice. It was a different kind of environment where the faculty really cares and shows you how to take school seriously."

Walton attributes her success at ECC Compton Center to the strong relationships she developed with almost all of her teachers, as well as the support she received through Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOP&S) and Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE).

EOP&S is a program that is designed to assist low-income and educationally-disadvantaged students achieve their educational goals at ECC Compton Center. CARE is a state-funded educational program that offers additional support for single parents pursuing their educational goals.

Walton applied to Cal State Dominguez Hills, Cal State Los Angeles, Cal State Fullerton, UC Irvine, UC San Diego and UC Riverside. UC Riverside was ultimately chosen because Walton wants to do her own research in psychology and sociology. The opportunity to live in the university's Family Housing with other students who are parents was also a strong draw.

In the future Walton would like to start her own non-profit called "It Starts with You" to help minorities go back to school. This is a goal she has already started working toward. Her tagline is, "It's not what you're community can do for you, but what you can do for your community."

"What good is it for you to get ahead and leave your brother behind," said Walton. "Make yourself and your community better."

It appears that Walton is already putting her theory into practice within her own family. Walton's accomplishments have inspired both her mother and her sister. Her mother is now a community college student and her sister is currently enrolled in the cosmetology program at ECC Compton Center.

Compton Community College District Temporarily Closes Track and Football Field for Upgrades

The Compton Community College District (CCCD) has temporarily closed access to the track and football field for necessary upgrades. The track and field are scheduled to reopen for public use on Tuesday, September 13, 2011. The track and field are located at 1111 E. Artesia Boulevard, Compton, CA 90221.

The closure is occurring in order to make much needed improvements and upgrades so the football field will be ready for the upcoming Tartar football season. The work being done includes turf maintenance and leveling, watering, and irrigation system repair, as well as outdoor lighting replacement and general refurbishment near the restrooms. It is important that these upgrades be completed without interference for proper field maintenance, and more importantly, for the safety of both Tartar athletes and community members who use this resource.

While the upgrades are taking place, the soccer field, immediately adjacent to the football field, has been made available as an alternative location to utilize for walking and running. El Camino College Compton Center Offers Hands-on Registration Assistance for Fall 2011 Semester

To aid students in the registration process for the fall 2011 semester, El Camino College Compton Center is offering an in-person registration period where students will get all the necessary assistance to complete their registration in one location. Beginning August 15 through September 1, students may register in the Student Lounge where a bank of computers will be available for registration and new student orientation. In addition, counselors and financial aid representatives will be on hand to assist students with educational plans and applying for financial aid.

In-person registration begins on Monday, August 15 through Thursday, September 1, and on Saturday, August 20. Registration hours are: Mon.-Thurs. 8:00 a.m.-6:30 p.m.; Fri. 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m.; and Sat. 8:00 a.m. to noon. ECC Compton Center is located at 1111 E. Artesia Blvd., Compton, CA 90221.

Courses are available in everything from general education, which will prepare students to transfer to a four-year college or university, to more than 15 different occupational programs designed for students looking to start a new career, or upgrade their skill set. Saturday, evening and online classes are also available. Saturday classes begin August 27 and weekday classes begin August 29.

For fall, student fees have increased by \$10, from \$26 to \$36 per unit, at all California Community Colleges. Students who qualify for the Board of Governors' (BOG) fee waiver program will not be affected by this increase. Additionally, a vast majority of students who do not qualify for BOG waivers may be eligible for financial aid that covers all or a portion of their fees. Students are encouraged to visit the Financial Aid office to learn more about finding the right types of financial aid. Despite the fee increase, California Community Colleges remain the best value in higher education in the state. All fees must be paid in full by Monday, August 22 or students will be dropped from their classes.

El Camino College Compton Center Offers Basic Robotics Course to High School Students

Area high school students (grades 9-12) are encouraged to explore science, mathematics, and engineering by enrolling in El Camino College Compton Center's Basic Robotics class. Enrollment is currently open and the class will begin Saturday, August 27.

The Basic Robotics class, taking place on Saturdays, consists of a lecture from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. followed by a lab from 10:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. The class introduces students to the technologies used to design, build, and program robotics systems. Other related topics will also be covered such as basic electronics theory, electromechanical fabrication, micro-controller operation, machining processes, metal fabrication and careers in technology. Students who earn a passing grade will receive high school credit, as well as two units of college credit.

The purpose of the Basic Robotics class is to present high school students information on electronics and manufacturing technology through the construction, testing and operation of functional robots. Participation in this class helps bring creative thinking alive and also builds important problem-solving skills. The robotics class is designed to inspire more students to enroll in college programs in mathematics, engineering, and science that will prepare them for future career opportunities in high-tech fields.

Funded by a \$662,700 grant from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, the Career Advancement Academy also has technical support from the Career Ladders Project.

The aerospace fastener industry is centered in Southern California. Over 10,000 Southern Californians are currently employed by local aerospace fasteners, manufacturers and distributors, but many of these veteran workers are due to retire. It is anticipated that numerous local employers will be looking to hire skilled students for entry-level positions over the next five years. Students enrolled in either the machine tool technology/aerospace fastener manufacturing or welding programs benefit from a curriculum that combines a practical, technical education with classes designed to strengthen reading, writing, and mathematical skills.

Students in the program benefit from: numerous career skills workshops covering topics such as resume writing, interviewing, job retention, interpersonal skills relating to the workplace, industry specific "green" classes, and total quality management. Books are also paid for, in addition to workplace safety boots for each student. The program culminates in an exclusive job fair with employers looking to hire.

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California Community Colleges Chancellor Jack Scott Appoints Thomas Henry as Interim Special Trustee to Compton Community College District

Fiscal management expert returns to district to lead accreditation push

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - California Community Colleges Chancellor Jack Scott today announced his appointment of fiscal management expert Thomas Henry as interim special trustee for the Compton Community College District (CCCD), citing his previous leadership at the district and successful accreditation track record elsewhere as keys to helping the CCCD regain its independence.

Henry served as special trustee to the CCCD from 2006 to 2007. He replaces Dr. Genethia Hudley-Hayes.

"I want to thank Dr. Hudley-Hayes for her service, and I am pleased that Tom Henry has agreed to return to service for the Compton Community College District," Chancellor Scott said. "His vast experience in fiscal matters and his familiarity with the district will be invaluable as the Compton Center continues to move toward accreditation as an independent college."

Henry recently served as special trustee at Solano Community College, which has been removed from all sanctions by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC). He currently serves as the special trustee for Lassen College, which also has been removed from ACCJC sanctions under his leadership. Henry is a former CEO of the Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team, an organization that assists community college and K-12 districts fulfill their financial and management responsibilities.

"I look forward to returning to the Compton District," said Henry, whose appointment is effective immediately. "I know the progress that has been made at the Compton Center working with El Camino College, and I look forward to positioning the Compton District to support the academic programs and student services of the Center. I have great respect for the students, faculty, staff and community of Compton and I am confident that, collectively, we can continue to move toward accreditation as an independent college."

The California Community Colleges is the largest system of higher education in the nation. It is composed of 72 districts and 112 colleges serving 2.6 million students per year. Community colleges supply workforce training, basic skills courses in English and math, and prepare students for transfer to four-year colleges and universities. The Chancellor's Office provides leadership, advocacy and support under the direction of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

New trustee appointed for Compton College

After reaching a dead end on budget issues that threatened the six-year partnership with EC, a door has finally opened. Chancellor Jack Scott has appointed a new interim special trustee, Thomas Henry, for Compton Community College.

Friday, it was announced that Henry will be the new interim special trustee, but those who previously knew him know he's not an unfamiliar face around campus.

Henry actually worked as a trustee for Compton College before and now he has returned.

Some people believe Henry will be the one to pull this college back where it needs to be, including Saul Panski, Compton Center Academic Senate president.

"He has a vast wealth of experience in these types of situations," Panski said "With his experience in aiding other colleges and even grade schools K through 12 that were also in this same situation, I believe Henry will be the one to get this college on the right track."

President Tom Fallo said he was not pleased before how Compton College was not accredited and that its accreditation was revoked.

However, Fallo said even with Henry's hiring, Compton College is going to have to go through a long process to attain accreditation.

Panski wasn't the only person who supported the Chancellor's decision in appointing Henry. The new appointee also had support from colleagues at the EC campus.

"I am confident that the returning Special Trustee Tom Henry and EC President Tom Fallo will have a strong working relationship that will benefit the fiscal soundness and academic progress of the Compton Educational Center," Christina Gold, Academic Senate President, said.

According to the Compton Educational Center (CEC) Academic Performance Profile, A new category of transfer rate has been added to the peer group report this year using newly available data from the Chancellor's Office. Tracking first-time, full-time transfer-directed students through six years, Compton College's transfer rate has steadily increased over the last three years.

"The EC Academic Senate is pleased to see clear academic gains made at the Compton Center since the beginning of the partnership," Gold said.


"As far as the agreement between EC and Compton College, it will remain the same and in good standing now that they found a replacement," she added

On another note, no one formally said that Compton College was moving toward its accreditation but that did not keep Panksi and Gold from believing that the college can work its way there toward being an accredited college.

"With Henry's experience I see good things with Compton College, and I see us obtaining accreditation in the near future," Panksi said.

With Gold in agreement she added that, "it will be a long journey back to accreditation for the Compton Center, but our faculty colleagues at Compton are making steady progress and Torrance campus faculty is here to support and assist them.

Gold also said that EC and Compton College are now in "good standing" after finding a new trustee.

El Camino College Compton Center Encourages Foster Youth to Explore the Youth Empowerment Strategies for Success (YESS) Program

El Camino College Compton Center is one of nine educational institutions in Los Angeles County to offer The Foundation for California Community Colleges' Youth Empowerment Strategies for Success (YESS) program. The YESS program is designed to provide foster youth ages 16-21 with academic and life-skills training so that they may successfully transition into adult life.

An upcoming orientation for the YESS program will take place on September 20, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. in the Foster Care Building at El Camino College Compton Center, located at 1111 E. Artesia Blvd., Compton, CA 90221. All attendees will enjoy complimentary dinner and school supplies.

The YESS Program at El Camino College Compton Center is open to foster care youth between the ages of 16 and 21 residing in the cities of Compton, Lynwood, Paramount, North Long Beach and Carson. Registration is required to participate in the YESS program.

Foster youth who enroll in the 14-week program are introduced to college and community resources, which will support their success. Students are able to earn high school and college credits, as well as gain scholarship and financial aid information. If students enroll in 12 or more units they may be offered a job at ECC Compton Center, which is a huge incentive for them to continue their education. YESS also offers interactive and handson training in basic life skills. Students build confidence by participating in experiential activities related to housing, money management, employment counseling and exploration, job skills, daily living skills and parenting.

The short-term goal is to give foster youth the tools they need to overcome hurdles they may face at different points along their path. While the long-term goal is for participants to graduate from high school, begin earning a college degree or technical certificate, as well as become self-sufficient and gainfully employed. The YESS program moves toward these goals with a three-pronged approach called the three R's, which stand for rigor, relevancy and relationships. As the program's website conveys, the three R's communicate a positive and proactive message: "YESS, together we can empower youth to better understand the impact of their choices, access post secondary education, build permanent relationships with caring adults, and obtain the skills, knowledge, and resources needed to succeed."

In Los Angeles alone, nearly 2,000 foster youth are emancipated each year. Without academic or life skills support, as many as 50 percent of them become homeless, have serious money problems, or end up incarcerated. The YESS program aims to prevent those problems by better preparing foster youth for independence. For more information visit:

YESS they can: Compton foster students strive for success

An old apartment complex with barred windows is the headquarters of El Camino College Compton Center's Foster Care Education Building, a place that provides resources and support to help foster students succeed. There are a variety of adult and youth programs offered by their Foster & Kinship Education, but one in particular seeks to improve all aspects of foster students' lives: the Youth Empowerment Strategies for Success program (YESS).

On Tuesday evening, YESS coordinator Shateo Griffin and instructor Johnny Conley invited potential students to learn more about the program. The one-hour meeting was part informational session, part support group for the foster students who simply want to graduate high school or further their college education. Over a dinner, Griffin and Conley explained the basics of the YESS program to a room of about 15 interested students.





In order to participate in the YESS program, students must enroll in two El Camino College classes: Introduction to College Planning and Career Planning. Although all El Camino college students can enroll in these classes, priority is given to foster students. The state-funded program is geared towards students ages 16 to 21 and meets twice a week for 12 weeks. Four modules covering education, employment, life skills, and financial responsibility are taught through a series of workshops and in-class speakers. Once the 12-week program is complete, students are guaranteed a job in the summer, as long as they enroll as a full-time college student during the school year and graduate high school or earn their GED.

During the informational session, program coordinators stressed that they wanted to cater to students' specific needs. Griffin said if students had questions for probation officers or

Planned Parenthood services, they had speakers lined up to answer their questions. She also offered to find representatives for each students' individual educational and career interest. Some subjects covered in class are how to obtain a social security card, writing a resume, practicing for a job interview, and opening a bank account. Students will learn about managing money and applying for financial aid and scholarships.

Some students participate in the YESS program because they need help passing the California High School Exit Exam. One Compton student said "I'm trying to make up some [high school] credits to get back on track. I got knocked off... but I got my head right." Others simply want to ensure they stay on the right track to graduate college. One student interested in the program already completed coursework to become a pharmacy technician but was returning to school to become a probation officer.

Conley, the only YESS instructor and a USC Masters of Education PASA alum, said: "You can benefit from [this program] if you're trying to get ahead or catch up." YESS has a 100% success rate, where every student completes the program and goes on to secure a summer job. According to Conley, the YESS program is ultimately "designed to have a higher college going culture in Compton and the SPA-6 area." That area covers Lynwood, Compton, Paramount, North Long Beach, and Carson.

When the coordinators weren't providing information about the program, they were providing encouraging words of support and advice to the students. Pameta Godfrey, one of the program's coordinators, offered an impromptu inspirational pep talk to the foster students. "Take advantage of everything. Don't feel bad because you've come from this kind of background," she said. "Everybody comes from somewhere. But you have to put it in yourself to make your life better, and break the chain. Go to college. Get the education. Tell your friends that this is the place to be."

El Camino College Compton Center's First Year Experience Program Provides Students with a Supportive Environment that Facilitates their Continued Success

Like many Californians, Maria Rojas was struggling to find work. Rojas' cousin, who is an El Camino College Compton Center alumna, encouraged her to consider going to college. After some initial trepidation, Rojas attended a registration assistance session where she was introduced to the First Year Experience (FYE) program. Rojas, a mother of four who had always struggled with staying in school, was a perfect candidate for this program and decided to enroll. The FYE program is designed to help students be successful in their first year of college by providing a learning community that includes educational and career services.

"Before the FYE program my approach to life was that whatever is going to happen is going to happen and there's not much you can do about it. Now I know that whatever effort I put forth matters. This next year, my goal is to keep up my GPA and get straight A's," says Rojas.

This new outlook represents a transformation that occurred in Rojas as a result of FYE. In 1993, just a couple months shy of graduating from Narbonne High School, Rojas dropped out. Years later, in 2004, her coworkers at an alcohol and drug recovery treatment center motivated her to go back to school and earn her high school diploma. It took less than a year, but after completing the process she decided to take some time off to raise her four children instead of continuing on to college. Another six years would pass before she enrolled as a student at ECC Compton Center in 2010.

Looking back on the 2010-2011 academic year, Rojas says, "I became really close with all of the FYE students. We were all different ages and came from different backgrounds, but together we made such a great group. At one point, I remember wishing that all of my loved ones could have this same experience."

One of the classes responsible for bringing the 2010-2011 FYE cohort together was Human Development, taught by FYE Program Director Rebecca Mason. In addition to helping the students pinpoint their likes and dislikes in order to choose a major, Mason emphasizes the idea that the students need to become the creators of their own destiny. Another focus of the program is to encourage the students to apply for scholarships. All of the recommendations and hard work paid off for Rojas, who was the recipient of two scholarships: the Behavioral Sciences scholarship and the Robert Spieker scholarship.

Rojas is looking forward to excelling in her classes this coming year and preparing to transfer. She would like to go to California State University, Dominguez Hills or California State University, Long Beach to study history.

"I want to be a history teacher because I am inspired by my father's love of history. He's the type of person who will give you a history lesson anytime you ask him a question."

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
