

All voters share this negative outlook, but it is consistently higher among those ages 18-49 and Latinos.




From what you know, is there a local community college district that serves your area? (Open-ended)





...and compared to ten years ago, a larger share of voters cannot rate Compton College's job performance.








Voters are reluctant to pay higher taxes as the cost of living, prices and inflation have surged.

Compton College is an important resource for many different groups that use the College's campus









Compton College serves the needs of my community






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Most continue to think the college prepares students to transfer and provides a safe learning environment.








Simulated 75-Word Compton CCD Bond Measure Title & Summary

COMPTON COLLEGE REPAIR, JOB TRAINING AND EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT MEASURE.

To repair, construct, acquire educational facilities, sites, equipment; support career education for students/workers/veterans, firefighter/police training; remove asbestos; upgrade science labs, computer technology, campus/earthquake safety, handicap accessibility; provide community healthcare services/training; shall Compton Community College District authorize \$150,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying \$20 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, generating \$11,000,000 annually while bonds are outstanding be adopted, requiring audits, oversight, all funds used locally?




The bond measure starts with strong support as three in four vote in favor, including more than four in ten who would vote "definitely yes" if the election were today.





Men and women support the bond at equally high rates.


Vote After Information by Gender





Three-quarters of Democrats, seven in ten nonpartisans and a majority of Republicans vote in favor.


Vote After Information by Party

Vote After Information by Age







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Q6. Based on this description, would you vote yes in favor, or no to oppose it?

Vote After Information by Gender by Age








Voters of all races and ethnicities vote in favor but support for the bond measure is higher among African Americans and Latinos.


Vote After Information by Race/Ethnicity

Vote After Information by City






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The measure also has broad support across the **Compton CCD Trustee Districts.**

Vote After Information by Trustee District






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However, support falls when the property tax implications of the measure are highlighted.








Upgrading job training technology and specific types of career education programs are highly important.






Three in four strongly support using bond funds to remove lead paint and provide healthcare services to the community.






Most identify healthcare career education and building a Fire Academy to train first-responders as highly important uses of bond funds.






Notably, voters are less inclined to express a strong preference for using bond funds for a non-specific new classroom building.






Today, there is less intense emphasis on citizens' oversight and replacing outdated classrooms.

The Impact of Educational Statements

Educational Statements

Ranked by Percentage Saying Statement is a VERY Convincing Reason to Vote Yes

(BETTER LIFE) Most Compton College students qualify for financial aid, and many are the first in their family to go to college. This measure ensures that our community college can continue to help local residents by setting them on a path for a high-demand, good-paying career to give themselves and their families a better life.

(BASIC REPAIRS) Much of the Compton College campus was built over 60 years ago in the 1950s, and many buildings, classrooms, science labs and job training equipment are deteriorating and outdated. This measure will address urgent and basic repairs such as upgrading electrical systems, gas and sewer lines, fixing leaky roofs, repairing bathrooms and replacing outdated plumbing and wiring to provide safe, clean drinking water and remove mold, lead and asbestos.

*(LOCAL ECONOMY) Passing this measure will be an economic engine that will support good-paying, local construction jobs for years to come and generate new opportunities for small business and entrepreneurs. By upgrading vital education and job training programs, it ensures our community has a highly skilled workforce to retain and attract businesses and companies to support a healthy economy and strong and thriving middle-class families.

(CAMPUS SAFETY) The health and safety of Compton College students, educators and staff must be a top priority, including addressing the threat of school shootings and gun violence. This includes installing up-to-date fire safety doors, smoke alarms and sprinkler systems, and making campuses more secure by adding cameras, perimeter fencing, emergency door locks and other life safety notifications in classrooms that can help to protect schools and improve police 911 response times.


Ranked by Percentage Saying Statement is a VERY Convincing Reason to Vote Yes

- (FIRST RESPONDERS) Our community needs highly skilled and well-trained nurses, police officers, firefighters and paramedics to provide local residents access to fast and effective 911 emergency response services. This measure will make it possible for Compton College to upgrade classrooms and labs that essential healthcare workers and first-responders need to train for careers that are vital to public safety.
- *(CAREER) Good-paying jobs in today's competitive, global economy demand specialized training and education. To ensure local students and workers have the education and training to compete and succeed in our local workforce, this measure will upgrade Compton College classrooms, labs and equipment for career education programs in automotive technology, aerospace, nursing, welding, early childhood education and other in-demand careers that require specific skills.
- *(AFFORDABLE) In the worst economy in years, Compton College saves local students and families thousands of dollars by offering an affordable alternative to the skyrocketing cost of four-year universities. This measure will increase opportunities for local students to earn college credits, certifications, and job skills at a reasonable price and then transfer to a four-year university.
- (ACCOUNTABILITY) This bond measure includes strict accountability requirements including public disclosure reports and independent annual financial and performance audits to make sure all funds are used effectively, efficiently and as promised. Furthermore, <u>no</u> money from this measure will go towards administrators' salaries or pensions and all funds will be used locally.
- *(VETERANS) Compton College is one of the few places that provides local veterans access to vital services and specialized programs to address their needs. The College serves our local veterans and their family members by providing counseling, tutoring, career education programs and other vital services to help them complete their education and enter the civilian workforce.



The educational statements mitigate voter concern about the bond's tax implications as seven in ten vote yes, including four in ten who intensely back the bond.






The survey also tested an argument against the bond measure to simulate potential opposition:


Compton College board members and bureaucrats want to raise local property taxes with inflation skyrocketing and record high prices for gas, food and housing. Too many working families, small businesses and seniors on fixed incomes are barely able to make ends meet as it is. Instead of trying to burden us with higher taxes, Compton College must cut wasteful spending, reduce six-figure salaries for administrators and enact pension reform to save taxpayer money.








Support declines following this statement but remains above the 55% threshold needed to pass a Compton College bond measure.




Segmentation Analysis & Educating the Compton College Community

Segmenting the Electorate

- Consistent Yes: Voters who consistently indicated they would vote "yes" on the measure
- Consistent No: Voters who consistently indicated they would vote "no" on the measure
- Swing: Voters who do not fall into any of the other categories – remaining consistently undecided or switching positions

The following slide shows demographic groups that *disproportionately* fall into one category or the other.

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Conclusions

Conclusions

- Compton CCD voters hold a pessimistic outlook as they are more likely to believe the state, LA County and their own communities are "on the wrong track".
- This mindset is consistent with voter research across California as the public expresses a high degree concern about the cost of living and rising prices, homelessness and access to affordable housing, crime and a lack of confidence in public officials.
- The survey also finds that voter familiarity with Compton College is lower today than it was in a 2014 survey fewer voters identify Compton College as their local community college and nearly half cannot rate the quality of the college.
- Despite these factors, voters are highly receptive to a potential bond measure for the college as more than seven in ten vote in favor based on a simulated 75-word ballot title and summary, which includes more than four in ten who vote "definitely yes" to approve.
- Top priorities include protecting drinking water, career education and job training, campus security, preparing students to transfer to 4-year schools and making healthcare more accessible.
- Statements that simulate a public education and community outreach program resonate strongly

 this includes the themes of putting students and workers on a path to success, making
 essential health and safety repairs and investing to strengthen the local economy.
- The survey shows voters to be very concerned about the tax implications of passing a local community college bond measure and support declines when highlighted.
- Nevertheless, this survey finds broad support for a Compton College bond measure and suggests the district is well-positioned provided the public understands its needs and funding priorities.



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
