Course Description

This is a four-week online course that teaches information literacy skills essential for effective identification, location, evaluation and citation of library and information resources for college-level research. You will learn how to locate and evaluate traditional print and electronic library materials; how to document resources; and how to prepare a bibliography. You will also acquire proficiency in the use of information technology to better realize the full potential of library resources.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to produce an annotated bibliography on an academic research topic that reflects a focused research question, selection of appropriate keywords, effective evaluation and selection of sources, and adherence to citation rules.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO)

We will work together throughout this course to achieve the following learning outcomes:

- 1. Analyze a topic to construct research questions and search strategies appropriate to the select information retrieval tool used;
- 2. Locate and retrieve information efficiently and effectively using online catalogs, databases, Internet websites and other information retrieval tools;
- 3. Compare information from various sources and formats and critically evaluate to determine value and application for academic research;
- 4. Demonstrate applied understanding of issues surrounding copyright and fair use and the necessity of citation through correct compilation, organization and presentation of print and electronic information sources.

Coursework

Participation (140 points) – 25%

Assignments (140 points) – 25%

Each unit includes project-based assessments that allow you to apply your conceptual and procedural knowledge. These assignments include several exercises and papers, such as:

- Evaluation of materials
- Online searches using selected tools

Quizzes (60 points) – 10%

There are several graded quizzes throughout this course. These quizzes are worth varying points and cover different subjects and concepts, including:

Midterm: Progress Consultation (60 points) – 10%

We will have midterm **Progress Consultations** between **April 25 to 29, 2022**. The consultation is a one-on-one online meeting in Zoom, where we will go over your completed <u>Self-Evaluation</u> <u>Form</u> to examine your progress in class. <u>It is your responsibility to schedule the meeting.</u>

Final: Annotated Bibliography (170 points) – 30%

The final is a cumulative demonstration of your ability to effectively identify, locate, evaluate, select and cite print and electronic information sources appropriate for a college-level research project. The final must include two each of books and articles from scholarly peer-reviewed journals. Each source must be cited following MLA 8th edition style with annotation. This assignment is due by 11:59 PM May 13, 2022. No late work is accepted for the final.

Late Work

Coursework may be submitted late but will receive an automatic deduction of <u>5% of total</u> points per day late.

Final annotated bibliography must be submitted by 11:59 PM May 13, 2022. No late work is accepted for the final.
